The Topics



AGRI

Grow big or go home: European farmers have been protesting against restrictive regulations and rising consumer prices, while national agricultural plans still fail to meet European targets. With the current Common Agricultural Policy (CAP) framework set to expire in 2027, how can the EU support smallholders and promote sustainable rural livelihoods?



CONT

Say "Cheese!": Since 2020, Big Meat and Big Dairy, which receive 82% of the EU's agricultural subsidies, have actively lobbied against environmental reforms. Their efforts have significantly contributed to the weakening or postponement of six key climate policies, including the Farm to Fork Strategy and the Sustainable Food Systems Framework. What can the EU do to ensure that its climate agenda is not compromised by the influence of heavily subsidised sectors?



CULT

Lost In Translation: Despite the rich linguistic diversity across many EU Member States, constitutional protections often remain limited, leaving numerous regional and minority languages vulnerable to decline. How can the EU strengthen the protection of minority languages and successfully preserve them for future generations?



ECON

Cash In, Cash Out: While the EU is moving towards a harmonised €10,000 limit on cash payments to improve transparency and modernise economies, cash remains the dominant payment method in several Member States, particularly in rural areas and amongst older generations. What can the EU do to promote secure payment systems while ensuring financial inclusion for those still reliant on cash?





ITRE

Not In My Backyard: As European countries accelerate their renewable energy transition, many rural communities are pushing back against the adoption of solar and wind farms, raising concerns about visual pollution and environmental damage. How can the EU align its environmental policies with the growing dissent of said communities?



LIBE

From Guns to Grants: Ongoing investigations in countries like Italy and Greece have raised concerns over the misuse of EU recovery and subsidy funds. With corruption and organised crime threatening the effective use of these resources, what actions can the EU take to enhance oversight and prevent money laundering?



TRAN

Who Let The Crowds Out? Since the rise of mass tourism, often social-media driven, there have been growing concerns about overcrowding in small European villages, such as Hallstatt in Austria or the Cinque Terre in Italy. In light of the overwhelming flow of visitors these towns have faced in recent years, and of their economic dependence on tourism, how can the EU help them balance their sustainable development with the preservation of their cultural heritage and livability?

The venues

Teambuilding and Committee Work

Parish of the Sant'Alessandro Church

Traditionally used as a **parish community hall**, the Oratory is a welcoming and versatile space that often hosts educational and cultural activities in the city. Located just a **few steps from the accommodation**, it will provide the setting for the team building and committee work activities.

General Assembly

<u>Auditorium Conservatorio di Musica "F.A.</u> <u>Bonporti" Riva del Garda</u>

The General Assembly will be held in the Auditorium of the Conservatorio "F.A. Bonporti." Built in 1987, this prestigious hall combines excellent acoustics with elegant architecture. Normally used for concerts and musical performances, it will instead serve as the stage for the final debates and resolutions of the session.





Accomodation

Hotel Diana

Officials will be accommodated at Hotel Diana, located less than five minutes from the committee work venue. The hotel offers **comfortable rooms and a welcoming atmosphere**, ensuring everyone has the chance to rest and recharge after the day's activities. **Towels and bed linens will be provided!**

Useful Information

What will you need?

During the session, we will provide you with the needed materials.

However, we would highly recommend **bringing with you a computer or a tablet**, as we aim at reducing the environmental impact of the event. Always bearing in mind the environment, we would ask you to **bring your own cups, mugs or bottles**, so as to minimise plastic waste.

The Dress Code

The different moments of the session require different dress codes, but don't worry: you'll be here to enjoy the session and get the most out of it!

During **Teambuilding**, we would suggest **comfortable clothes**, as you will participate in activities requiring movement. For the **Committee Work**, **smart casual clothes** are required, as you'll be working on your resolution. Finally, the **General Assembly** requires a **formal dress code**, such as suits, blouses and blazers; nevertheless, make sure you wear something that makes you feel comfortable and that you deem appropriate!

The Safe Person

EYP keeps in the highest consideration the wellbeing of its participants and enacts measures assuring each person attending the session a **safe and welcoming environment**. At every EYP Event an Event Safe Person (ESP) is present. The role of the ESP is to be available for any questions or concerns regarding the EYP Policies.

Moreover, the ESP is responsible for attending to individuals who feel they have been victim of harmful behaviour at the session and for responding to any incident that may occur.

How to reach Riva del Garda

Riva del Garda can be reached only by bus or private transport, but there are multiple well-connected cities nearby. Generally, you will have to pass through **Rovereto**, which is **the closest train hub** to the town. Then, you will need to get a bus, which timetables can be found **here**.

BY TRAIN

The closest train station is **Rovereto**, and it can be easily reached from some of the biggest Italian cities like Florence, Rome, or Bologna, as well as with a direct train from Munich in Germany. Then, from Rovereto you can take the bus to Riva del Garda.

BY PLANE

The closest airport is **Verona Valerio Catullo (VRN)**; from the airport, you can reach Verona's central station, from which you can arrive in Rovereto.

Nevertheless, as Rovereto is connected to many cities, you can also fly to all the main airports of northern Italy. Here they are **listed in order of best connected**: Milano Bergamo, Milano Linate, Bologna, Milano Malpensa, Venezia Marco Polo (VCE), Firenze, and Rome, and get to their respective train stations.

BY BUS

The best way to reach Riva del Garda by bus is, you guessed it, to go **through Rovereto or Trento**. They are connected to many Italian, Austrian and German cities such as Verona, Bologna, Innsbruck, and Munich.

Alternatively, if you are coming from the south, you might take **the lakeside line**, which is very suggestive but far less practical and slower overall. You can find some information <u>here!</u>
